**JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING APRIL 3, 2023 TO APRIL 9, 2023 AS NATIONAL PUBLIC HEALTH WEEK**

WHEREAS, approximately 29 million people still lack health insurance in the United States, and the uninsured are less likely to receive preventive care and less likely to seek care as quickly when they are sick, resulting in higher costs when they do seek treatment; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, health care spending represented 17.5% of the nation's gross domestic product, and it is expected to reach 20.1% by 2025; and

WHEREAS, rising health care costs contribute to the nation's federal deficit and reduce the ability to spend in other important areas including education, housing and economic development; and

WHEREAS, the United States spends far more on medical care than any other industrialized nation, but is ranked 26 out of 43 in terms of life expectancy, and the overall United States death rate has increased, leading to a drop in overall life expectancy for the first time since 1993, particularly among people younger than 65; and

WHEREAS, only 3% of the nation's health care spending is focused on prevention and public health, when chronic conditions, which are the most common, costly and preventable of all health problems, account for 86% of the nation's health care costs; and

WHEREAS, in the United States, 7 in 10 deaths are related to chronic diseases such as obesity, diabetes, high blood pressure, heart disease and cancer, which are largely preventable, and 90% of health care dollars are spent treating such diseases, with only 3 cents of each health care dollar spent in the United States going toward prevention; and

WHEREAS, health inequities related to income and access to coverage exist across demographic lines, but African Americans of all ages are more than twice as likely to die from diabetes than white persons, and Hispanic high school students are 80% more likely to have attempted suicide than non-Hispanic white high school students; and

WHEREAS, March 23, 2023 marked the 13th anniversary of the federal Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act, and during open enrollment for 2023, nearly 16,400,000 consumers selected or were automatically re-enrolled in health insurance coverage; now, therefore, be it

**RESOLVED:** That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize April 3, 2023 to April 9, 2023 as National Public Health Week, and to express our support for expanding health care coverage and lowering health care costs for Maine families.

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The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Sanford, Representative Mastraccio, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **MASTRACCIO**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Women and Men of the House. I rise today to honor Leon Tanguay, who passed away in January at the age of 98. Yesterday would've been his 99th birthday. Mr. Tanguay was a

veteran of the United States Army, serving in World War II. Drafted in 1943, just short of his 19th birthday, he headed for England and the invasion of Normandy. As an Army scout, Leon had gone out ahead of his platoon as they made their way inland from the Beaches of Normandy. Alone, just outside of Sancerre, France, he was captured by the Germans. He spent nine months as a prisoner of war in Germany. He and other prisoners spent most of their time working on Germany's railroad. Leon witnessed Nazi cruelty firsthand. By April of 1945, the Germans had fled in anticipation of the arrival of the Allied Forces and he and his fellow prisoners were ultimately liberated. After the war, Leon married, bought a house and raised a family of five children in Sanford. He worked as a mason, well-known for his stone fireplaces, until he retired at the age of 85. When he passed, he was still living in the same house he had purchased after the war. In 2022, the street where he lived was renamed Tanguay Street in his honor. Leon Tanguay was a much-beloved member of the Sanford community and a regular participant at any event honoring those who serve our country. He was well aware that he was one of the lucky ones and celebrated that fact every day. He will be long-remembered and missed by all who knew him. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from Portland, Representative Moonen, who wishes to address the House on the record.

Representative **MOONEN**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. In 2019, which was the 75th anniversary of the Allies landing in France on D-Day, I had the extraordinary opportunity to join a delegation of legislative leaders from around the country on an NCSL trip to Normandy. We spent a week talking across party lines and learning from each other as well as touring the key beaches, battlefields, and towns of D-Day and the days that followed. One of those days, we visited the American Cemetery, where we laid a wreath at the memorial to the thousands of Americans lost in Normandy. Then we stayed for the lowering of the flags that occurs just before the cemetery closes for the day. In a you-can't-make-this-stuff-up moment, there was someone else present for that flag-lowering; 95-year-old Leon Tanguay of Sanford, Maine. As you heard, Leon fought in France, he earned the Silver Star, and he was captured and held as a prisoner of war in Nazi Germany for nine months. That trip in 2019 was his very first time returning to Normandy in the 75 years since the war ended. Meeting Leon and his family and friends from Sanford and Shapleigh who accompanied him on his return trip and watching him speak in both English and French, with so many people coming up to him and thanking him and wishing him well, added so much more to an incredibly moving day.

Last summer, I saw Leon at a Memorial Day event at the Veterans Cemetery in Sanford. I was so excited to see him again, though I do have to admit he was a lot more excited to see the Chief Executive. He was in great spirits and he told us about his plans for another return trip to Normandy for his upcoming 100th birthday. I'm so sorry that trip won't happen but I am so grateful for the incredible coincidence of timing that allowed me to meet Leon in Normandy that day and for his life of service to Maine, to our country and to freedom and democracy around the world. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from New Gloucester, Representative Arata.

Representative **ARATA**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. Madam Speaker, this bill does not belong in the Judiciary Committee because it legalizes late-term abortion until birth for any reason, with no penalties for those who perform abortions without medical licensing or training. It has no business being referred to the Judiciary Committee. The Judiciary members have no frame of reference for specifically how an abortion of a fully-developed baby would be performed. Judiciary Committee members do not have expertise on how much pain dismemberment prior to removal from the uterus would cause to the baby. Judiciary Committee members do not have expertise on the physical and emotional damage late-term abortion causes, including death. The Judiciary Committee does not

have expertise on whether such a bill will lead to rapists coming to Maine to get abortions performed on rape victims by unlicensed people in order to cover up the evidence of the rape. Madam Speaker, this bill is beneath the dignity of this Body and should die here today before it has a chance to kill anybody. Thank you.

**JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING APRIL 2023 AS SEXUAL ASSAULT AWARENESS MONTH**

WHEREAS, sexual assault affects all communities in Maine and people of all races, genders and economic backgrounds, and over 14,000 people in Maine are sexually assaulted each year and one in 5 Maine citizens will experience sexual violence in their lifetimes; and

WHEREAS, the effects of sexual violence have wide-ranging public health ramifications and societal costs, and survivors and their loved ones can experience consequences including mental health crises, substance use disorder, homelessness, lost wages and health care costs, among others; and

WHEREAS, sexual violence affects certain groups more often, and that disproportionate impact is related to historical experiences of marginalization and oppression, providing the evidence that sexual assault is a tool of control and power; and

WHEREAS, systems of support for survivors of sexual assault often have inadequate resources, do not provide adequate options for justice and healing and retraumatize survivors; and

WHEREAS, widespread stigma and misconceptions around sexual violence result in low rates of reporting of crimes, increased isolation and shame for victims and the continuation of cultures of violence; and

WHEREAS, raising awareness in our communities about the causes of and solutions to sexual violence can lead to long-term positive cultural and systemic changes, and building a future free from sexual violence requires us to commit to making those changes; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Special Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize April 2023 as Sexual Assault Awareness Month and to express our support for and encouragement of all those affected by sexual violence; and be it further
