JOINT RESOLUTION RECOGNIZING MARCH 8, 2023 AS INTERNATIONAL WOMEN'S DAY

WHEREAS, International Women's Day has been celebrated since 1911; and

WHEREAS, Maine women have contributed greatly to the State's, the country's and the world's history; and

WHEREAS, those Maine women include Frances Perkins, the first woman appointed to the United States Cabinet; Margaret Chase Smith, the first woman to serve in both the United States House of Representatives and the United States Senate; Olympia Snowe, the first woman to serve in both chambers at both the state and federal levels; Edna St. Vincent Millay, a Pulitzer Prize-winning poet; Cornelia "Fly Rod" Crosby, the first registered Maine guide; Samantha Smith, an international peace advocate; Gail Laughlin, the first woman in Maine to practice law; Dorothea Dix, a nurse and advocate for the mentally ill; Frannie Peabody, an HIV/AIDS activist; Judith Isaacson, a Holocaust survivor and educator; Mary Low, one of the first American women to receive a Bachelor of Arts degree; Elizabeth Russell, a groundbreaking geneticist; Florence Whitehouse, a suffragist, activist and novelist; Rena Newell, currently serving as Chief of the Passamaquoddy Tribe; Rachel Talbot Ross, the first African American woman to serve as Speaker of the Maine House of Representatives; Valerie Stanfill, currently serving as Chief Justice of the Maine Supreme Judicial Court; and Janet T. Mills, the first woman in Maine to serve as Attorney General of Maine and the first woman to serve as Governor of Maine; and

WHEREAS, according to the Center for American Women and Politics, in 2023 a record 32.7% of the 7,386 seats in the 99 state legislative chambers in the United States are currently held by women, including 44.1% of the seats in the Maine Legislature; and

WHEREAS, Maine is one of 16 states with a woman serving as a presiding officer of its Legislature; now, therefore, be it

RESOLVED: That We, the Members of the One Hundred and Thirty-first Legislature now assembled in the First Regular Session, on behalf of the people we represent, take this opportunity to recognize the contributions of Maine women throughout our history, the ongoing march toward gender equality, both in Maine and around the world, and the designation of March 8, 2023 as International Women's Day.

READ.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from York, Representative Sargent.

Representative **SARGENT**: Thank you, Madam Speaker, Women and Men of the House. I rise today as a proud daughter of Maine to join our Maine voices with people around the world who celebrate International Women's Day. It's appropriate that Maine should be represented among the voices because, as you see enumerated in this Resolve and we see in all of our communities, the power of pioneering Maine women. One hundred years ago this very winter, 1923, Dora Pinkham, representing the County, was the first woman elected to the Maine Legislature. I think about how she must have felt --

The SPEAKER: The Member will defer. Please direct all of your comments through the Chair. The Member will proceed.

The Chair reminded Representative SARGENT of York to address her comments toward the Speaker.

Representative **SARGENT**: I wonder how she must have felt as she walked into this Chamber and looked around to see that she was the only female. As I walked into this Chamber this morning to proudly take my seat, I was reminded that, indeed, this Legislature has 44.1% women, it has representation in all leadership, it has women serving beside our enlightened men Members in all of the committees. And that we set an example. Maine is a beacon and has been for the march toward equality and I ask my fellow Members for us not to become complacent, that the march continues. The World Economic Forum now projects that it will take 132 years at the current pace toward equality for women to achieve parity. Thankfully, Maine is way ahead of that. But we cannot forget that we are the role models and we are the workers that project this to future generations. Thank you, Madam Speaker.

The SPEAKER: The Chair recognizes the Representative from South Portland, Representative Reckitt.

Representative **RECKITT**: Thank you, Madam Speaker. I rise today having spent the last two evenings accidentally tripping over a documentary on Netflix entitled "Feminists: What Were They Thinking?" It's a very interesting retrospective of the 1970s and up through today. I recommend it highly and it inspired my remarks today.

I have to say that in 1973, 50 years ago, almost to the day; I didn't research whether it was actually the day; but this month, I first set foot in this State House. Not as a legislator but as a 20-something young woman in the women's movement, lobbying for the ratification of the federal Equal Rights Amendment, which I might remind you all has still not been ratified to this day. Fifty years ago, I was terrified, I was totally intimidated by the numbers of people in this House. I barely dared open my mouth, I know you find that hard to believe, many

of you, but I really was intimidated but glad to be here. But I was not glad to lose the battle that year. But some of you may know, I'm a tad stubborn, and so, I was back the next year, Madam Speaker, and that year, we won. And I think that there's a pattern there that I'd like to repeat soon.

I want to just mention that we've been asked to speak relatively briefly so, I'm going to try to do that, although it sort of goes against my nature, but I would want to tell you a couple of things. I asked the other day for someone to research exactly what the composition of the House and the Senate was in terms of women and there were some very interesting statistics and I'm going to give you the total. I'm going to give you the nonpartisan picture. In 1973, there was one woman in the Senate, in the Maine Senate. In 1973, there were 18 women in the Maine House. Today, there are 14 women in the Maine Senate and there are 68 women in the Maine House. And as you have already heard, that approximates about 44% of this Body is women. And the thing that you may or may not know is sociological studies have shown that whenever a body who is trying to work together gets to the level where it's 30% women, then the whole tone of it changes. And I like to think that the collegial and frankly collaborative tone of this Body and this Legislature as a whole is helped by the fact that on both sides of the aisle, there are substantial numbers of women and I'm thrilled to be here in this Body today and I'll save my longer dissertation for another day when we're not short of time.

But, anyway, I'm pleased to be here, I'm pleased that 50 years later I'm standing in this spot instead of shaking with nerves in the hallway and I think that all of us who are here today, both men and women, should be grateful of the numbers we have. We're close to parity, which of course would be my goal, anyway, and I hope that we will all continue to work collaboratively and collegially together for the balance of this session. Thank you very much, Madam Speaker.
